PSHE and Citizenship Policy

PSHE is a non-statutory subject within the National Curriculum. However, here at Beormund Primary School we are committed to the development of the whole child and as a consequence we place Personal, Social, Health and Economic Education (PSHE) and Relationships and Sex Education (RSE) at the heart of all that we do. We recognise that schools support pupils to develop in many diverse aspects of life, and the responsibility of preparing pupils for their adult lives is one that Beormund Primary School takes pride in, and assumes with passion and purpose.

This policy has been written to ensure we are meeting the requirements of National Curriculum 2000, which includes a non-statutory framework for Personal, Social and Health Education (PSHE) and Citizenship at KS1 and 2, and also takes into account further guidance issued by QCA in 2002 and incorporates SEAL materials and Every Child Matters guidance (2004).

National Curriculum framework (2.1):

‘Every state funded school must offer a curriculum which is balanced and broadly based and which: “promotes the spiritual, moral, cultural, mental and physical development of students at the school and of society” and “prepares students at the school for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of later life”.

DfE requirements ‘All schools should make provision for personal, social, health and economic education (PSHE,) drawing on good practice.’ ‘Schools should seek to use PSHE education to build, where appropriate, on the statutory content already outlined in the national curriculum, the basic school curriculum and in statutory guidance on: drug education, financial education, sex and relationship education (SRE) and the importance of physical activity and diet for a healthy life style.’@

PSHE and Safeguarding

Westfield House teaches learners about safety and relationships to enable learners to recognise when they and others are at risk. The PSHE programme aims to equip learners with the skills, strategies and language they need to take appropriate action and keep safe.



What is PSHE?

PSHE encompasses all areas designed to promote children's personal, social and health development. It gives children the knowledge, skills and understanding that they need to stay healthy and safe, develop worthwhile relationships, respect differences, develop independence and responsibility, make the most of their own abilities and those of others. It is very closely linked with Every Child Matters, S.M.S.C., and encompasses our work within Citizenship, S.E.A.L. and towards Enhanced National Healthy Schools Status.

What is Citizenship education?

There are 3 interrelated strands in the framework: -

- Social and moral responsibility
- Community involvement
- Political literacy

These should be taught to prepare children to play an active role as members of a democratic society, to develop independence and responsibility, and to make informed choices about their own lifestyle.

What is S.E.A.L.?

SEAL is a teaching programme (social and emotional aspects of learning) which will help the children in their personal, social and emotional development. It will bring together work we have been teaching in our PSHE curriculum and each term we will teach a topic across the whole school. These topics will be

- New Beginnings- Sept/ Oct
- Getting on and Falling out, including Friendships Week (Anti-Bullying) w/c 16.11.20)) - Nov/ Dec
- Going for Goals - Jan/ Feb
- Good to be Me - Feb/Mar
- Relationships -Apr/ May
- Changes - June/ July

SEAL will help children to develop self-awareness, motivation, social skills and managing their feelings. These skills will help our children to become better learners, get on better with other people and be responsible citizens. They are part of every area of life.

Our ethos and PSHE curriculum ensure that we meet the 5 strands of Every Child Matters which states that every child has the right to: Be Healthy, Stay Safe, Enjoy and Achieve, Make a Positive Contribution, and Achieve Economic Well-being.

Aims of PSHE and Citizenship Education at Beormund Primary School

Our school mission statement reflects what we hope to achieve in PSHE and Citizenship. We want our children to develop self-awareness, positive self-esteem and confidence, enabling them to,

- stay as healthy as possible
- keep themselves and others safe
- have worthwhile and fulfilling relationships



- respect the differences between people
- develop independence and responsibility
- play an active role as members of a democratic society
- make the most of their own abilities and those of others
- behave in a socially and morally acceptable way including towards authority and each other
- to become involved in the life of their community
- to know about democracy and how to be an active citizens
- to know about economic wellbeing.

We want our children to: -

- value the achievements they make, and the achievements of others
- make informed choices about dealing with risks and meeting challenges now and in the future.
- decide on values by which they want to live their lives.

Our school curriculum and ethos promotes spiritual, moral, social and cultural development and prepares all pupils for the opportunities and responsibilities within their lives.

Curriculum content

Our programme for PSHE includes the Christopher Winter Project and SEAL materials for each year group with planning adapted to meet the needs of the children in those year groups. Aspects of PSHE and Citizenship will also be covered within other subject teaching and in special days and weeks. (see attached scheme of work). In the Foundation Stage, the same themes are taught each year and revisited regularly, as well as following the stepping stones for the Early Learning Goals and SEAL will be taught in special days/weeks. There will be assemblies each half-term to introduce the SEAL theme and to celebrate achievement.

Delivery of Curriculum

A range of teaching strategies will be used as appropriate. These will include:

Circle time, role-play, discussion – whole class, small group, 1:1, visitors e.g. PC, Fire Brigade, School Health Advisor etc., stories e.g. exploring behaviour of characters, creative activities, and pupil initiated activities.

There are weekly timetabled PSHCE lessons in KS1 and KS2, and specific events and activities, as well as through other subjects. There will also be opportunities during collective worship e.g. stories and discussion, Achievers Assembly. The whole school ethos promotes our work in PSHE and Citizenship, as set out in our Mission Statement and home-school agreement.

Teachers will choose the method most appropriate for their whole class to meet the objectives of the lesson. The PSHE and Citizenship curriculum will be linked to our work towards National Healthy Schools status. **All classes use circle time to promote and discuss issues within PSHE and Citizenship.**

The elected school council are actively involved in promoting PSHE and Citizenship issues, as are other 'school teams'.



School Values

The school values focus on the acquisition of key qualities that ensure pupils are able to meet Beormund Primary's PSHE Intent Statement. The level and depth of pupils' understanding of individual values progresses and deepens as they themselves mature during their journey through school.

Positive attitudes and relationships are central to Beormund Primary School's values which are:

- Honesty
- Empathy
- Resilience
- Integrity
- Perseverance

Assessment

Children's understanding, knowledge and skills are assessed through observation, discussion and questioning and participation in groups. Children will be involved in self-assessment e.g. talking about their own experiences, making comments in SEAL record book in each classroom and in special assemblies celebrating achievement.

Children will be rewarded in line with school policy e.g. goals for good behaviour, raffle tickets, stickers and certificates in Achievers Assembly assembly.

General comments about PSHE and Citizenship will be included in annual reports to parents, and children have the opportunity to write their own comments about how they have done.

Monitoring and Evaluation

Samples of work, including photographs and questioning of children, will be collected by the class team on a termly basis to be kept in the achievement portfolio.

Brenda Bartlett is our governor responsible for PSHE and citizenship, and Linda Mannas (SLT) has responsibility for pupil welfare. The PSHCE governor works closely to ensure that our aims are being met. The school has an action plan as part of the work towards our Enhanced Healthy Schools status and will carry out self-review of those targets. PSHE and Citizenship provision will have clearly defined learning outcomes, shown on the planning sheets, and these are shared with children as part of assessment for learning.

When budget allows, staff will attend courses etc. to keep up-to-date with developments. The PSHCE lead will pass on to staff any further information as it becomes available and will attend any future training courses for this subject, disseminating information as appropriate. The PSHE lead may attend LA network sessions for co-ordinators as appropriate.



Equal Opportunities

Provision for PSHE and Citizenship is in line with all of our policies and Every Child Matters guidance. All children have equal access to the PSHE and Citizenship curriculum and developmentally appropriate materials. Delivery will be differentiated appropriately. Resources etc. are sensitive to the needs and backgrounds of the children and will not reflect gender or cultural stereotypes, and are monitored annually to ensure that sensitivity.

Parental and Community Involvement

Parents are invited to join in events in school, including workshops on relevant themes. Parents are regularly informed of events and developments in the newsletter.

Working with parents is a vital part of the whole school approach to PSHE and Citizenship. Aspects of it are included in our home – school agreement.

There will also be links with local community and services, as part of the work in Citizenship. We involve outside agencies e.g. School Health Advisors, School Police liaison officer, dental health advisors etc. as much as possible to deliver aspects of the curriculum. These are highlighted in our scheme of work for PSHE and Citizenship.

This school believes that partnership with parents and the community enables us to receive specialist support and information to plan the best possible PSHE and Citizenship curriculum for our children.
